




Luke 14:21-23 'Go out quickly to the streets and lanes of the city, and bring in the poor and crippled and blind and lame.' And the servant said, 'Sir, what you commanded has been done, and still there is room.' And the master said to the servant, 'Go out to the highways and hedges and compel people to come in, that my house may be filled.

Death is a reality that we all must face but for the person who has struggled in addiction for many years, often one of the consequences is a shortened life. In just the span of a few months we have lost four men who regularly attended the Good News Chapel. Each man was unique and special and ended up coming to the Good News Chapel for a variety of different reasons.

George was a part of our church from the very beginning (16 years ago this month). He had FAS and grew up in the foster care system. He suffered with shame all of his life and had been hurt by many others. George was invited to the great banquet that Jesus describes in His parable but he didn't consider himself worthy to enter in. But finally George did respond and he came to know the love of Jesus Christ personally and we saw a great transformation in him in the final years of his life.





girlfriend a few years ago. He had attended many churches throughout his life but was never born again. It wasn't until he came to the Good News Chapel that he understood that he was not a genuine follower of Jesus Christ. In spite of this knowledge he struggled with truly repenting of his sins and surrendering to Jesus Christ and entering into the great banguet. He fell hard into drinking during COVID and never overcame. He ended up dying in his addiction.

Rudy first came to the Good News Chapel with friends who were in addiction who were just looking for food. Rudy had more half brothers and sisters than he could count and struggled with addiction most of his life. He was a war veteran and yet ended up living on the streets at one point but eventually was able to get a place to live and his life ended in a place of relative stability. While we don't know for sure if he entered into the great banquet feast that Jesus had invited him to, we have hope that Rudy entered in. He came to church regularly and was well liked by everyone.

Ken ended up coming to the Good News Chapel through friends that he knew. He had COPD due to his past life and struggled with believing that he could ever overcome his past addictions. But Ken also entered into the great banquet and God gave him the victory. Ken was instrumental in God leading us to plant a church on Muskowekwan First Nation. Ken's last service at the Good News Chapel was on Christmas Day and his funeral service in early January was the introduction for the new church on the reserve.

We do not know who God is going to save but we are thankful for the opportunity to serve Him and that everyone is invited to His great banquet!







On Saturday January 21st at 2 pm we had our first church service at the band hall on Muskowekwan First Nation! We have been able to have services every Saturday since then (with the exception of one blizzard day).

It will take time to build relationships and to see people coming to the services every week. We have had about ten different families attend so far but not on a consistent basis. We have a few core families that have been attending regularly. As the weather changes we plan to start a bi-weekly Bible study and look for other opportunities to build relationships in the community.

There are currently five Pastors (from the Good News Chapel, Valley Alliance Church in Fort Qu'Appelle, and Yorkton Alliance Church) rotating preaching duties going through the Book of Luke so that those who hear will have a firm foundation on the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Each service also has children's church, which will teach kids the truth of the Bible in a way that they can understand, with the hopes that children of Muskowekwan will grow in the knowledge of the Lord.
